

NEWTON FERRERS AND NOSS MAYO WI ANNUAL REPORT 2014-2015

What a year this has been! Throughout the history of our WI, the state of the Hall has been of main concern. How lucky are we today to stand in this wonderfully Refurbished Hall, amongst our friends, united together in the knowledge that so much has been achieved. Our thanks must go to all those who helped to bring this about.

This time last year we held our Annual Meeting in the Church, as our WI was in effect "homeless" as we prepared for the works ahead. We had wondered if our WI would be able to continue in the same manner due to the change of venue, but I am sure we can look back and say that it was a pleasant time and that we enjoyed being in the Church for our meetings. During this Annual Meeting it was decided that the Committee and President should remain in place to speed up proceedings with the Hall. This month also saw progress with the Crockery sponsorship and use of the recently introduced Bring and Buy Stall. Our enthusiasm for WI events continued and a group of Ladies enjoyed a trip to Pentille Castle gardens, by all accounts they enjoyed the Tea too! Throughout May we kept busy with the Drama Group pondering the direction of the Annual performance, with lack of a stage and no certain dates for rehearsal availability. The Craft Group started meeting at members' homes as an easy way to keep the group together. This was greatly appreciated by all and made for some interesting meetings. Emma held some Coffee Mornings to welcome the new members who had joined us this year. Several Committee Members attended these to extend the hand of friendship and introduce themselves.

While the sun shone through June, Emma kept an eye on proceedings at the Hall. Scarcely a day passed that she or Brenda were not on site helping to sort out plans and problems. June was busy for the rest of the WI too. Caroline organised a lunch at PL1 which 17 members attended, through car share. This was a very Jolly event, thank you Caroline. The DFWI Agatha Christie Day was attended by 8 Ladies with mysteries in mind. Emma and Carrie attended a meeting of the Dementia Friendly Parishes of the Yealm in order to represent the WI. The craft Group met at Jeanne Vennings' home and made beautiful boxes under her guidance.

In July the usual Craft Group Summer Party had a change of venue as the Green outside the hall or what was left of the Hall, had disappeared under builders tools and skips. We were kindly entertained by Rosemary Watts where we brought plates of food to share and had a Show and Tell which gave rise to much admiration and mirth. The Choir sang at St. Peter's open day.

There was no formal meeting in August as we all busied about with friends and family enjoying the Regatta. The Presidents Evening was thus moved to September 2nd, when we enjoyed a wonderful evening of homespun entertainment and a delicious 2 course meal, prepared by Caroline and her band of willing helpers, the Social Committee.
